Session #11

Now for the fun border! Dimensional stitches in the L menu include three different types of stitches. The applique, which we used in session 5, Sequin stitches which allow you to sew on sequins, and Pop-up stitches which we are going to use today for our border. Some of the pop-up stitches combine applique and pop-up, and some are just pop-up. We want only pop-up. I chose a simple one, #43 for the border. Then we will add the outer border and you will be done with your quilt top!



Supplies:

- Robison-Anton cotton thread
- Pictogram Pen
- INSPIRA® Tear Away Light Stabilizer 620112796
- Scraps from other blocks for corner stones
- Clear 1/4" Piecing Foot 412927447
- Clear ¹/₄" Piecing Foot with Guide 412927445

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Cut:

From the 2 yards of tone on tone print for border and Spanish Hemstitch block:


- Two strips $3\frac{1}{2}$ " x $60\frac{1}{2}$ " for inner pop-up border
- Two strips $3^{1/2}$ " x $40^{1/2}$ " for inner pop-up border
- One strip 3½" x 10" for practice

From scraps:

Approximately 160 - 1" x 1" square for flowers Four squares $3\frac{1}{2}$ " x $3\frac{1}{2}$ " for inner border cornerstones Four squares $3\frac{1}{2}$ " x $3\frac{1}{2}$ " for outer border cornerstones

From outer border fabric:

Two strips 67" x 3½" Two strips 47" x 3½"




Sew:

1. Mark a line $1\frac{1}{4}$ " in from the edge along all four strips using your Pictogram pen.




2. Select L43

- 3. Snap on you B Foot.
- 4. Place a strip of INSPIRA® Tear Away Light Stabilizer underneath your fabric.
- 5. Touch Needle Stop Down
- 6. With the line on the left, begin stitching 1/4" from the end of the fabric, on the line. Sew until the machine stops. (A) I like to use the Stop Start Button for this, so I don't second guess myself as to whether or not the machine stopped, or I did!
- 7. Fold one of your 1" squares in quarters and insert it to the right of the needle as shown (B).
- 8. Stitch until your machine stops.
- 9. Rotate the fabric 90 degrees counter clockwise so the folded square is behind the foot (C).
- 10. Stitch until the machine stops. It has sewn the satin stitch detail.
- 11. Turn it back to where it originally was and sew until the machine stops (D).
- 12. Look at your cute flower! (E)
- 13. Repeat with all four of your border strips.
- 14. Tear off the stabilizer and trim the point of the flower into a curve.
- 15. Snap on your favorite 1/4" Piecing Foot.
- 16. Stitch the two $3\frac{1}{2}$ " x $3\frac{1}{2}$ " inner border squares to each end of the $3\frac{1}{2}$ " x $40\frac{1}{2}$ " inner pop-up border pieces.















- 17. Stitch the two 3½" x 60½" border pieces to the long sides of your quilt top. The border determines the size, if you need to, ease in the quilt top. I had a bit of excess in the quilt top but it eased in easily without a problem. Just be sure the longer side (that needs to be eased in) is down as you sew.
- 18. Finish by sewing on the two remaining border pieces with the corner stones.
- 19. Stitch the 3½" x 3½" outer border corner stones to ends of the two 67" x 3½" outer border strips.
- 20. Stitch the two 47" x 3½" strips to the bottom of your quilt top.
- 21. Stitch the other two strips with the corner stones attached to the sides of your quilt top.
- 22. Your quilt top is done!
